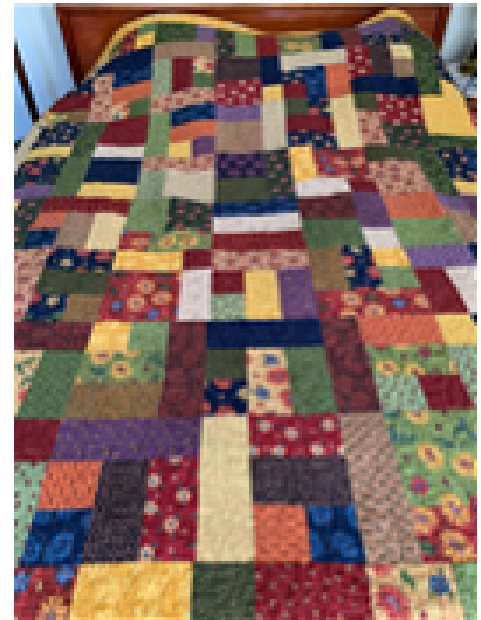


This is "one" of my favorite quilts. I have quite a few! These are original papercut designs that I cut, transferred onto cloth and machine appliqued.

This is the best quilt I ever made. It was made from my husband's ties. It took about a year to make (in my spare time). It consists of 62 or 63 ties. First, I washed all of the ties and air dried them. Then I ripped out all of the ties and ironed them. Then I cut them into various sized strips. I used a string quilt method and sewed the tie strips to muslin squares and then put the squares together. The silk was difficult to work with but came out beautifully.
